

Progress on Strategic Plan Objectives

- Goal I: Thinking Like a Network By Delivery of Standardized Programs
 - FPAN SE and FPAN NE partnered with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) at the Jupiter Lighthouse to train lighthouse volunteers as Heritage Monitoring Scouts.
- Goal 2: Increase Protection of Archaeological Resources By Working at the Local Level
 - FPAN SE staff assisted Palm Beach County archaeologist Chris Davenport with excavations at an archaic tree island site near Belle Glade.
- Goal 3: Provide for the Long-Term Viability of the Network
 - Fenn took an SAA continuing education class-'Addressing Orphaned Collections:
 A Practical Approach', which will inform the region's efforts to document and rehouse these collections
 - Ayers-Rigsby worked with Biscayne National Park and the Florida Keys National Marine Santuary to document migrant crafts slated to be removed by the marine sanctuary.
